2021 FALL/WINTER TRI-LEVEL DOUBLES

LOCAL LEAGUE REGULATIONS

All captains and players are responsible for following these rules & regulations.

GOVERNING RULES:

Captains and players are expected to be familiar with the 2022 National/Eastern Regulations found on the Eastern website at [2022 National and Eastern Regulations](#). **Where an issue is not addressed in these local rules, refer to the 2022 National/Eastern regulations for guidance.** For the purposes of local leagues, players should refer to the appropriate section (The Code) in "[2021 Friend At Court](#)" for unofficiated matches.

FORMAT AND GENERAL INFORMATION:

Trilevel Leagues:

Women's and Men's Teams: 1st doubles: 4.5; 2nd doubles: 4.0; 3rd doubles: 3.5

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- Each team shall have a minimum of six (6) registered players (1 at each level is required).
- Each team must have use of three courts for home matches; a minimum of 2 hours should be reserved.
- Match fee is \$26 per player. Home team fees may differ and are at the discretion of the individual clubs.
- Each match will consist of three doubles matches, one at each level.
- 3rd Set – 10 point Match Tiebreak (1st to 10, win by 2). COMAN rotation for all set & match tie-breaks.
- Lower-rated players are permitted to "play up" one court. (For example: a 4.0 may play up to 4.5 or a 3.0 player may play up to 3.5). Players may not play on a court below their rating.
- This league will use a points system (1 point per individual court) to determine standings.

REGISTRATION / NTRP RATING:

- **Self-rated players may play in the local season of the 4.5/4.0/3.5 Mid Hudson league. Further information regarding eligibility for post-season play can be found in the 2021/2022 USTA Eastern Trilevel League Regulations.**
- For 4.5 trilevel leagues, players will register with their 2019 year-end rating. Self-rated players WILL BE permitted to play in these local leagues. Please be sure to use all the guidelines for self-rating (self-rated players may be subject to self-rate grievance disqualification if the correct player background information is not provided). For 4.0 Trilevel leagues, players will register with their 2021 year-end rating.
- Registration remains open through the completion of the regular season.

TEAM MEMBERS' RESPONSIBILITIES:

- All players must register through Tennis Link at www.tennislink.usta.com/leagues. All participating team members must be registered prior to playing in a match. If an unregistered player participates in a match, all point(s) won on that court shall be reversed.
- Players are permitted to play on more than one team in the same area, provided the teams are not at the same tri-level. (Example – a 4.0 may compete in the 4.0 on a 3.0/3.5/4.0 team AND a 3.5/4.0/4.5 team).

- Any registration transfers or credits must be requested before the end of the regular season and prior to post-season play.

TEAM CAPTAINS' RESPONSIBILITIES:

- Make sure all players are registered through TennisLink and listed on an official roster.
- Contact the visiting captain at least five days prior to the match to confirm the site, availability of courts, time of matches and confirm that there are no forfeits.
- Cancellations of less than 24 hours will be subject to payment of court fees if the home club requires. Your team may be subject to a forfeit of the next match unless required payments settled.
- Be present at every match or assign someone in to be the acting captain.
- Exchange lineups simultaneously, prior to starting play, and record scores of each match.
- The home team is responsible for providing match balls.
- Both team captains are responsible for entering & confirming scores through TennisLink, within 48 hours!

MATCH REGULATIONS:

- Match play begins 15 minutes after the published start time of the match.
- There is a fifteen-minute default rule (inclusive of warm up time) in effect for all local matches. The opposing captain has the discretion to extend the default time and play the match if it is possible to do so. All late players are guaranteed a 5-minute warm up, and NO POINT PENALTY is allowed for a late player. In extenuating circumstances, a captain can reach out to a league coordinator regarding lateness, and the League Coordinator has the ability to extend the default time if deemed necessary. For staggered matches, a team cannot claim a default unless a court has been available to play for 15 minutes, and the opposing players are at least 15 minutes later than the agreed upon arrival time. If, after the scorecards have been exchanged but prior to the first point of an individual match being played, a player becomes unable or unavailable to play; a substitution may be made using a rostered player.
- If 1st or 2nd doubles must be defaulted, the lower court is not required to play the higher level match. Simply default the appropriate court.
- All matches will be best of three sets, with regular scoring and a match tiebreak in lieu of a third set.
- Captains should discuss prior to the start if the courts must be vacated at the 2 hour mark. If so, please play right up until the 2 hour match end time and use the timed match procedure to determine the winner of the match.
- If a match is timed out before completion, please select "timed match" instead of "completed."

RESCHEDULING MATCHES:

It is important for the sake of league standings and fairness for all teams that all matches be completed. For a match to be considered valid, at least 2 courts must be played. Every effort should be made to keep the matches as scheduled.

- Matches can only be rescheduled with the prior approval of the local league coordinator, and only two courts need to be rescheduled to constitute a valid match. The team requesting the reschedule will default one individual match. The team that has been asked to reschedule will choose the defaulted court. All three courts may be rescheduled if both captains agree.
- Captains have 72 hours from the day of the originally scheduled match to agree on a reschedule date for an incomplete court (s). Two viable dates must be given as options by the home team. If a date is not confirmed within this time period, the League Coordinator will set the date. Captains must report the rescheduled date to the League Coordinator. Incomplete court (s) that occur within the last two weeks of the season may be rescheduled by the League Coordinator.

If reschedules cannot be accomplished, the team that causes an illegal match to occur may have their matches removed to calculate final standings. A team that has caused an illegal match & not played all of their matches may not advance to playoffs, even if they have the higher standing. That team may also be restricted from participating in the league the following year.

TIMED MATCH PROCEDURE:

USTA Eastern – Mid Hudson Area Timed Match Procedure

*****This procedure to be used ONLY when a facility requires a match to be timed to 2 hours.**

*****Players to decide ahead of time which timepiece will be used to time the match.**

*****Procedure below to begin 5 minutes before the two hour time limit.**

Timed match Procedure (to start at 1:55 in the match):

A game in progress should be completed then use the steps below to determine the winner:

1. If the teams have split sets, a deciding point should be played to determine the winner. **The server stays in rotation for the deciding point and the receiving side chooses which player (ad or deuce) will receive. (Except in mixed where the serve is gender to gender.)**
2. If the team that won the first set is on serve, tied, or ahead by 1 break or more in the 2nd set, that team is the winner of the match.
3. If the team that won the first set is losing the 2nd set by 1 break or more, the match is now considered tied and a deciding point must be played to determine a winner. **The server stays in rotation for the deciding point and the receiving side chooses which player (ad or deuce) will receive. (Except in mixed where the serve is gender to gender.)**
4. If the teams have split sets and are in the middle of a match tiebreak (in lieu of a third set), the match is decided according to the following guidelines:
 - If the match tiebreak is tied - a deciding point must be played to determine the winner. **The server stays in rotation for the deciding point and the receiving side chooses which player (ad or deuce) will receive. (Except in mixed where the serve is gender to gender.)**
 - If a team is up by one or more points - that team is the winner of the match.
5. If the teams are in a second set tiebreak, the match is decided according to the following guidelines:
 - The team that is up by one or more points in that tiebreak wins the set (and it can then be decided if there is a match winner or if the match is now tied).
 - If the score in the second set tiebreak is even - a deciding point is played to determine the winner of the set. **The server stays in rotation for the deciding point and the receiving side chooses which player (ad or deuce) will receive. (Except in mixed where the serve is gender to gender.)**

If the sets are now tied - another deciding point should be played to determine the winner of the match. **The server stays in rotation for the deciding point and the receiving side chooses which player (ad or deuce) will receive. (Except in mixed where the serve is gender to gender.)**

SCORING:

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The local league champion is determined by the greatest number of team wins. In the event of a tie in a league that uses match wins, whether in round robin or single elimination competition, the tie shall be broken by the first of the following procedures that does so:

- a. Individual Matches
 - b. Head-to-Head (if all teams involved in the tie have played each other the same number of times)
 - c. Number of Sets Lost
 - d. Number of Games Lost
 - e. Game Winning Percentage
- In case of a default, the non-defaulting party shall be credited with a 6-0, 6-0 win.

CHAMPIONSHIPS:

Details regarding advancement to Championship play, including Regional and Sectional Championships, will be communicated to captains in a timely manner.

To be eligible to advance to the 4.5 Trilevel Regionals, Sectionals and the National Invitational Tournament a player must have a valid "C" rating after 2021 Year End Ratings have been published. Please see 2021/2022 Eastern Trilevel League Regulations for the definition of a valid "C" rating, and for number of matches required for regional and sectionals.

Administrative Processes:

1. NTRP Appeals:

Computer rated players may appeal their ratings electronically on the TennisLink website.

Self rated players may also appeal on the Tennislink website, with a decision made by the NTRP Appeals Committee. There shall be no further right of appeal from the decision of the NTRP Appeal Committee. Please refer to the Eastern Section website for Medical Appeals forms and instructions (see link below under Self-Rate Grievances).

2. NTRP Grievances:

If a captain or coordinator believes a player is competing at one level or more below their actual skill level, a grievance may be filed at the Section level only. Players with a valid computer or benchmark rating or granted an automatic appeal of a computer rating are not subject to an NTRP Grievance.

Pursuant to USTA Eastern C.5, a separate NTRP Grievance Form must be completed for each player being grieved and forms containing multiple names will be dismissed without consideration.

3. Local Grievances:

Informal notification should be made within 48 hours of the incident or dispute by the captain to their coordinator.

The grievance must be filed prior to the commencement of whichever occurs first: (a) the involved team's next match listed in Tennislink, whether or not the involved player participates or (b) within 24 hours after the end of the local league season, prior to the next listed match for either team involved in the conflict or dispute.

In order for a grievance to be valid, it must state the specific rule or rules within the Local Rules, USTA Regulations or standards of good conduct, fair play and good sportsmanship that have been violated.

The Coordinator shall forward the grievance to the opposing captain, who shall have a set time limit to respond. The coordinator shall forward the grievance and response to the Chair of the Grievance Committee. The Local Grievance Committee shall review the grievance and make a determination in accordance with its procedures.

Appeals after the grievance decision may be made to the Sectional Appeals Committee within the time period and in the manner specified in the decision.

2021/2022 USTA EASTERN TRI-LEVEL DOUBLES REGULATIONS

All Eastern Tri-Level Leagues shall follow these regulations and the USTA Eastern Adult League Play Regulations as documented herein and follow “The Code”.

- Women’s and Men’s team, any three adjacent levels (i.e., 4.5-4.0-3.5, 4.0-3.5-3.0, 3.5-3.0-2.5).
- Lower rated players are permitted to “play up” one court. (For example: a 4.0 may play up to 4.5 or a 3.0 player may play up to 3.5 but not to 4.0). Players may not play on a court below their rating.
- Each team shall have a minimum of six (6) registered players but are encouraged have additional players.
- Each match will consist of three doubles matches, one at each level. Format is order of strength – e.g., 1st doubles 4.5, 2nd doubles 4.0, 3rd doubles 3.5. If there is a default, players are not required to move up to a higher level court.
- A Match Tiebreak will be used in lieu of a third set (1st to 10 by 2)
- To qualify for Regional or Sectional Championships a player must have played a minimum of 1 match (defaults do not count)
- Winning teams may advance to a Sectional Championship for the 4.5-4.0-3.5 level and 4.0-3.5-3.0 level. Sectional winners may be eligible to participate in a national invitational tournament; eligibility criteria for the invitational tournament are at the discretion of the National Tournament Director and not the Eastern Section.
- **Ratings:**
Players shall start local league play using their 2019 year end rating or a valid self rating.

4.5-4.0-3.5 level: To advance to the National Invitational Tournament a player must have a valid “C” rating after 2021 Year End Ratings have been published. More specific details of rating are outlined below under “Accepted Rating Types for 2022 National Invitational.” The same eligibility requirements will apply for participation in Regionals and Sectionals.

- 2019 Computer rated players (C ratings only) may continue to play at their 2019 C rating for Regionals and Sectionals unless the player is bumped up two levels when 2021 year end ratings are published. If a player is bumped up two levels they shall play at their 2021 year end C rating.
- 2019 S, M, A and T players shall only advance to regionals and sectionals if they receive a 2021 year end C rating, and then they shall play at their 2021 year end C rating.
- Players who appeal their 2021 year end rating are not eligible to play at their appealed level. Players are only eligible to play at the C rating initially received when 2021 year end ratings were published.
- All players who had a 2019 “C” rating must play at that level for Regionals, Sectionals and the National Invitational, even if they were bumped down in 2021 YE ratings.

All other levels: self-rated players may play, and at the 4.0-3.5-3.0 level, are allowed to advance to Sectional Championships based on the following parameters:

- 2019 Computer rated players (C ratings only) may continue to play at their 2019 C rating for Regionals and Sectionals unless the player is bumped up two levels when 2021 year end ratings are published. If a player is bumped up two levels they shall play at their 2021 year end C rating.
- 2019 S, M, A and T may continue at their current rating only if they did not receive a 2021 rating. S, M, A and T players who did receive a 2021 rating must switch to that rating on 1/1/22.

Note: National Regulations supercede Eastern regulations and shall be followed. For Regionals and Sectional Championships, Eastern will follow the player eligibility, including any future changes, for the National Invitational Tournament

Accepted Rating Types for 2022 National Invitational

Computer "C" Rated Players: Players must have a valid "C" rating after 2021 Year End Ratings have been published in order to participate in the Tri Level National Invitational to be held in 2022.

Question: If a "C" Computer generated player who competes in 2021 gets bumped up when Year End ratings are released, can they still participate at the NTRP level they played at in 2021?

Example: 3.5 "C" Computer rated player gets bumped up to 4.0 "C". Can they still play in the invitational at 3.5 "C"?

Answer: Yes, as a "C" Computer generated player, this player MAY play in the Tri-Level National Invitational held in 2022 at the NTRP level they played at in 2021.

However, SHOULD A PLAYER MOVE UP TWO LEVELS AT YEAR END THEY MUST PLAY AT THEIR NEW HIGHEST LEVEL INSTEAD OF THEIR ORIGINAL ROSTERED LEVEL.

Example a 3.5C rated player earns a 4.5C rating with 2021 Year End Ratings they must play at the 4.5 level.

Question: If a "C" rated player appeals their 2021 Year End Rating Down and is now showing as an "A" appealed player, are they able to play at their lower appealed rating?

Answer: No. If a player earned a "C" year end rating in 2021 and they appealed their rating down through tennislink and now have a valid "A" rating, they will be allowed to play but at the "C" rating level they earned in 2021.

For example if a player earned a 4.0 C rating and they appeal their rating down to a 3.5 A, they **may** play at the Tri Level invitational as a 4.0 rated player.

“S” Self rated, “A” Appealed, “M” Mixed, or “T” Tournament players may only play if they earn a “C” Computer year-end rating when 2021 Year End Rating are published and they must play at the “C” rating level that they earned with the 2021 Year End Ratings.

Question: If a “S” Self rated, “A” Appealed, “M” Mixed, or “T” Tournament player who competed in 2021 gets bumped up at 2021 Year End Ratings, can they still participate at the NTRP level they played at in 2021?

Example: A 3.5 S” Self rated, “A” Appealed, “M” Mixed, or “T” Tournament player gets bumped up to 4.0 “C”. Can they still play in the 2022 event at the 3.5 level?

Answer: No. A “S” Self rated, “A” Appealed, “M” Mixed, or “T” Tournament player MAY ONLY PLAY IF THEY EARNED A “C” COMPUTER YEAR-END RATING IN 2021 AND THEY MUST PLAY AT THE “C” COMPUTER RATING LEVEL THAT THEY EARNED DURING 2021 YEAR END RATINGS.

Example: A “S” Self rated, “A” Appealed, “M” Mixed, or “T” Tournament player gets bumped up to 4.0 “C” they must play at the 4.0 NTRP level at the Tri Level Invitational held in 2022. Please note that a “S” Self rated, “A” Appealed, “M” Mixed, or “T” Tournament 4.5 player who got bumped up to 5.0 “C” WOULD NOT be eligible to play in the event held in 2022.

All players who had a 2019 “C” rating must play at that level for Regionals, Sectionals and the National Invitational, even if they were bumped down in 2021 YE ratings.

Question: If a “C” Computer generated player who competes in 2021 gets bumped down when Year End ratings are released, do they still participate at the NTRP level they played at in 2021?

Answer: Yes, a “C” Computer generated player who is bumped down with YER will play in the Tri-Level National Invitational held in 2022 at the NTRP level they played at in 2021.

Example: 4.5 “C” Computer rated player gets bumped down to 4.0 “C” with 2021 YER, that player would play as a 4.5 rated player in the Invitational held in 2022.
