Jenny Schnitzer Retires

After 33 years with the organization and more than a decade leading it, longtime USTA Eastern Executive Director Jenny Schnitzer will retire at the end of 2025.

Schnitzer joined the USTA Eastern staff right out of college to help grow the section's school and community programming. A prodigious Eastern junior who grew up playing in NYC parks, Schnitzer thought the gig was as close to kismet as you could get.

"I think [the work] means so much to me because I *was* that kid, right?" she explained. "I grew up playing in the parks. I went out and played with my family. I knew nothing about the USTA. But then one day one person came up to me while I was playing and said 'Hey, you're pretty good! Do you know about USTA tournaments?' She just talked to me about it, and then I signed up, and I got hooked. It takes one person to make a difference. I was a blue collar kid. Because of [this person], I learned about USTA tournaments and started playing in them. I got better the more tournaments I played. And because I got better, I got a scholarship to St. John's University. That was my first lesson in how important it is to build a pathway in your local community."

Of course, even though the role seemed like a perfect fit, she didn't get much—or any—time to acclimate. "My first week on the job, I had a volunteer call me," she recalled. "And he just yelled at me for 20 minutes about how upset he was. I finally said, 'Give me one thing I can do right. Let's work on one project together.' From that conversation, we became best friends."

Schnitzer headed to the volunteer's little town of White Meadow Lake, N.J., and together they grew a community park program from 20 to 100 participants.

"To watch somebody take a small program, reach out to the entire area and build it up like that...I just saw the big picture," she said. "We could do this across the section, and that really became the goal."

That experience shaped Schnitzer's entire tenure with USTA Eastern. As she rose up the ranks, she combined that big-picture vision and compassionate can-do work ethic to great effect—and continually emphasized the importance of building community pathways, or as she would call it, "connecting the dots." Once she successfully convinced a school district to integrate tennis into its P.E. curriculum, for instance, she immediately turned her attention to keeping kids engaged in the sport beyond the classroom.

Over the years, she collaborated closely with community tennis associations and recruited many volunteers to help provide additional programming. Some of those volunteers would go on to do so much for the section in the ensuing years that they later won national awards for their endeavors; some were even inducted into the Eastern Tennis Hall

of Fame. One, club owner Ari Roberts, is currently serving as USTA Eastern's president.

"My club opened in 2010 in Goshen, and about a year later Jenny visited to sell me on everything USTA had to offer," he said of their first meeting. "She asked how USTA Eastern could help me and I started throwing out ideas, and Jenny's attitude of 'try and see what happens' is a big reason why MatchPoint is successful today. She genuinely cares, and she has the attitude that it's okay to take risks and that we shouldn't be afraid to fail. Her 'let's figure it out together' mindset is the reason so many great tennis organizations are flourishing across the section."

Even though she is stepping down as Executive Director, Schnitzer's own approach to growing the game will no doubt loom large and influence the organization and the greater Eastern tennis community into 2026 and beyond.

"It's about relationships," Schnitzer said. "It's the relationships we form locally that make a big difference. The local volunteers, the local club owner, the local park person. Without them, we couldn't do what we do to grow tennis. It's about their work. They are the boots on the ground. We're here to support them—with training, with guidance, with grants. And friendship."

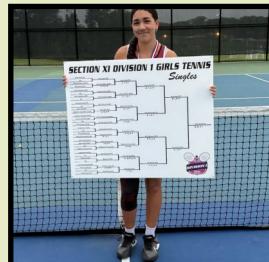

Girls' High School Tennis: Teams

We are the champions!

Long Island ruled the roost at the [USTA National Tennis Center](#) at the [New York State Public High School Athletic Association](#) Girls Tennis Team Championships this fall, bringing home the state titles for both large and small schools.

Syosset captured the Division 1 title, while Bayport-Blue Point brought home the Division 2 championship. Both teams won their school's first-ever girls state tennis title. Bayport-Blue Point won 4-1 over Edgemont while Syosset defeated Horace Greeley 5-2.

In Nassau County action, Cold Spring Harbor won its 4th straight Nassau County Small School (Division II) title. Syosset won its third straight Nassau County Girls Large School Championship with a 5-2 win over Port Washington. In Suffolk County play, Hills East defeated Westhampton Beach 4-3 to win its third straight [Section XI - Suffolk County Athletics](#) Large School Championship. Bayport-Blue Point won its fifth consecutive [Section XI - Suffolk County Athletics](#) Small School Title with a 4-3 victory over The Ross School.

Girls High School Season: Play for Pink

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, and Long Island's girls' tennis teams always work hard during the month to spread awareness at their matches and in some case raise money for breast cancer charities.

In September, 52 players from across Suffolk County gathered at Smithtown East High School for the annual *Bob Davis Play For Pink* Tournament. This event raised over \$1200 for the *Carol M. Baldwin Breast Care Center* (part of the *Stony Brook Cancer Center*).

According to Erick Sussin, coach at Ward Melville High School in East Setauket, the tournament consisted of 26 doubles teams playing a round-robin format of 8-minute mini-matches. Winners (Sofia Perez and Sofia Matos) and runners-up (Lydia Van Cott and Aleksa Brazyte) earned free entry to the Section XI tennis dinner in November.

According to Sussin, putting on this event was a team effort that included assistance from coaches John Selvaggio, Christine Klouda, Debbie Lutjen, Michael Comerchero, Erick Sussin (and wife Kathryn Gutleber), Section XI tennis chair Mark Mensch and the *Suffolk Tennis Coaches Association*.

Teams from across Long Island gathered at Cold Spring Harbor High School on a Sunday in October for a Play for Pink tennis tournament to raise money in honor of breast cancer awareness month.

"In our match against Southwest, which went on to the Final Four, we faced our second match point against us. Adam approached the net, Jaime ripped a shot seemingly past him — but Adam, at full extension, hit a ridiculous volley lob. Jaime chased it down and hit a pro-level tweener, but Adam wasn't deterred. He closed hard and hit a crazy put-away volley to win the point and save match point. Two points later, Adam's service winner sent Team Eastern to the Final Four. Without that point, we don't move on."

"I would not believe it if I weren't next to him. Really incredible — and more than you could possibly hope for at Nationals."

Congratulations to all our teams that represented Long Island and the Eastern Section with such passion, teamwork and sportsmanship. What a



season — and what a year to be part of this incredible community.

2026 USTA Eastern Tennis Conference

USTA Eastern cordially invites you to attend its 2026 Eastern Tennis Conference, which will be headlined by the most successful professional men's doubles pairing of all time: **Bob & Mike Bryan**.

Over the course of their 25-year playing careers, the Bryan Brothers captured a record 119 doubles titles together—including 16 Grand Slams, another record—and finished 10 seasons as the world No. 1 doubles team (yes...another record). They won a gold medal at the 2012 Olympics and helped Team USA secure the Davis Cup in 2007. From January 2005 to July 2006 they reached seven consecutive major finals, and in July 2013 they became just the 2nd men's duo in history to hold all four Grand Slams at the same time. For all their on-court achievements, this past summer the pair was inducted into the International Tennis Hall of Fame.

At the conference, which will be held January 30-31, 2026 at the Genesis Health Club at Saw Mill in Mount Kisco, NY, the Bryans will lead two on-court clinics that focus on different aspects of coaching and player development, and they will also participate in a wide-ranging Q&A about their experiences competing on the sport's biggest stages. This year's event centers primarily on coaching and will include a session featuring USTA Coaching Managing Director Megan Rose, who will share information about upcoming USTA initiatives in this area.

Coaches, parents and junior athletes, USTA League and tournament players, club managers and tournament directors, CTA and NJTL leaders, volunteers and anyone else interested in the future of the sport (and putting on their coaching hats!) should attend the
