Lorne McManigle

Academic Review Coordinator, NCAA

Lorne McManigle serves as the coordinator of academic review in the NCAA Eligibility Center. In her role, she processes initial-eligibility waivers, performs prospective student-athlete reviews, and educates member institutions and the public on initial-eligibility standards. Previously, she served as the NCAA Division III governance postgraduate intern, leading the DIII National Student-Athlete Advisory Committee mental health working group and organizing DIII governance programs. Prior to her positions at the NCAA, McManigle worked at a law firm in Raleigh, NC and served as a guardian ad litem, advocating for abused and neglected children.

A former tennis student-athlete and NCAA DIII singles national champion, McManigle spent two seasons following her undergraduate career as the women's tennis volunteer assistant coach at Duke University. During her time at Duke, the team won an ACC championship and competed in the NCAA DI national semifinals.

McManigle received her bachelor's degree in English and creative writing from Emory University. She then earned her JD from University of North Carolina School of Law and is currently a member of the North Carolina State Bar.



Melissa Schaub

Women's Tennis Coach, The Ohio State University

Melissa Schaub has led the Ohio State program into the upper echelon of women's tennis. The team made six straight NCAA Tournament appearances (2014-19) and was on pace to earn a seventh consecutive berth when the remainder of the 2020 season was cancelled because of the COVID-19 pandemic. Highlighting the NCAA bids were a quarterfinal appearance in 2016 and a semifinal berth in 2017. The Buckeyes won the Big Ten regular season and tournament championships in 2016 and '17.

A three-time Big Ten Coach of the Year, two-time ITA Midwest Region Coach of the Year and the 2017 ITA National Coach of the Year, Schaub spent her first campaign at Ohio State (2011-12) as an assistant coach before she was named interim head coach for 2012-13 and then took the reins as the head coach beginning in 2013-14. Her record at Ohio State is 154-55, with a 60-19 Big Ten regular season mark, through 2019-20.

Individually under Schaub, three Buckeyes have combined for four NCAA singles championship berths, with two doubles teams qualifying, including the 2017 NCAA Champions. Buckeyes have claimed three Big Ten Player of the Year honors, four Big Ten Freshman of the Year (and four ITA Midwest Rookie of the Year) awards and six Ohio State players have totaled 16 All-Big Ten accolades with Schaub at the helm.

The 2019 Buckeye squad was 19-7 overall, including a 12-match winning streak, and the team tied for third in the Big Ten with an 8-3 ledger while extending the program's NCAA Tournament appearance streak to six. Fukuda and Isabelle Boulais both were named First Team All-Big Ten, with Boulais, an at-large selection to the NCAA Singles Championship, also garnering Big Ten Freshman of the Year and ITA Midwest Region Rookie of the Year honors.

Schaub, a Lexington, Ohio, native who had a standout collegiate career at Tennessee, was on the coaching staff at Middle Tennessee State for five seasons, including one as head coach (2010-11), prior to joining the Ohio State staff.

Schaub played four years for the Tennessee Volunteers (2003-06), where she was ranked as high as No. 2 nationally in doubles and the squad reached the No. 4 spot in the national polls during her career.

Schaub was a two-sport athlete at Lexington High School, playing both tennis and basketball. She won the Ohio state singles title as a senior in 2001 when she led her squad to a third-place finish at the state tournament. She was a part of four conference and district championship squads during her career.

She is the daughter of Ron Schaub and Mindy Cooper. Her father, who played tennis at Ohio University, is the teaching pro at Lakewood Racquet Club and boys and girls tennis coach at Lexington High School.



Jeremy Wurtzman
Men's Tennis Coach, Indiana University

IU head coach Jeremy Wurtzman is in his sixth season with the Indiana men's tennis program.

In the 2019-20 season the Hoosiers went 8-3, their best start through 2011 matches since the 2010-11 season. The Hoosiers were ranked as high at No. 37 in the country on the season...Bennett Crane reached the final of the ITA Regional Championships and earned a spot in the ITA Fall National Championships. Crane was ranked as high as No. 49 on the reached and teamed with Zac Brodney to reach a ranking of No. 42.

Wurtzman guided the Hoosiers to a 17-10 record in his first season with the Indiana men's tennis program in the 2014-15 season. The Hoosiers won their most overall matches and conference matches since the 2012-13 season.

The 2013 Western Athletic Conference Coach of the Year, Wurtzman guided Denver to one of the most successful seasons in program history, leading the Pioneers to an 18-4 record and a perfect 8-0 mark in conference play. Prior to taking the helm at Denver, Wurtzman spent the 2008-09 season as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Ohio State, helping the Buckeyes men's tennis program to the Big Ten regular-season championship, the Big Ten Tournament title and an NCAA finals appearance against USC.

Wurtzman began his coaching career as an assistant coach for the University of Denver men's tennis team for two seasons (2006-08). During his first stint with the Pioneers, Denver posted a 31-14 record (.689), qualified for its first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance, achieved its highest team ranking of No. 37 in the Intercollegiate Tennis Association rankings.

Wurtzman enjoyed a successful professional playing career on the ATP World Tour, earning a top-30 American professional singles ranking, captured nine pro circuit doubles titles and was a three-time pro circuit singles finalist.

Ohio State's first tennis athlete to win an ITA individual championship, Wurtzman went on to win the 2003 ITA Midwest Regional crown before earning the No. 1 singles ranking the following season in 2004. After compiling 42 singles and 30 doubles victories in 2004, Wurtzman was named an All-American, the 2004 ITA/Farnsworth National Senior Player of the Year (co-honoree) and the Midwest Region IV Senior Player of the Year. In 2014, Wurtzman was elected to the Ohio State Hall of Fame.

A three-time All-Big Ten selection, Wurtzman finished his collegiate career with a 132-45 singles record and an 86-49 doubles record. Wurtzman received his bachelor's degree in Science of Human Ecology from Ohio State in 2008. Wurtzman, 34, and his wife, Gretchen, have two daughters and a son, Quinn (6), Maya (5) and Buckley (1).



Timon Corwin (Moderator)
General Manager/COO, Western Racquet Club; Chair, Collegiate Committee, USTA/Midwest Section

Timon Corwin, joined Western Racquet Club in June 2010. Previously, he served as the Senior Director for Junior and Collegiate Competition for USTA Player Development in Boca Raton, Florida. He was also the Men's Athletics Director and Men's Tennis Coach at Kalamazoo, Michigan.

Corwin was named Intercollegiate Tennis Association's NCAA Division III National Coach of the Year in 1997 and Midwest Regional Coach of the Year in 1999. From 1993-2007, Corwin was also the USTA National Tournament Director for the USTA Boys' 16 & 18 National Championships. In 2014, Corwin was enshrined into the ITA Men's Collegiate Tennis Hall of Fame.

Corwin played professionally after a successful collegiate career at Kalamazoo College. As an eight-time All-American in singles and doubles with the Kalamazoo men's tennis team from 1983-86, Corwin led his squad to the 1986 NCAA Division III team championship title while winning the singles crown. That year, Corwin was the recipient of the ITA's National Arthur Ashe Award for Leadership and Sportsmanship. Corwin went on to complete a post-graduate fellowship at Rheinische Friedrich-Wilhelms University in Bonn, Germany in 1987 and earned his law degree from the Marquette University Law School in 1992.

Corwin currently serves as the chair of the USTA Midwest Collegiate Committee.
