It was a year to celebrate as USTA Northern was named the 2017 USTA Section of the Year by *Tennis Industry* magazine.



Looking back on my first year as President of USTA Northern, I see tremendous growth, achievement and change for our organization. We made great strides in fulfilling our mission of promoting and developing the game of tennis in Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota and Northwestern Wisconsin for players of all ages and ability levels looking to find themselves in the game.

Several new initiatives were introduced in 2017 including the Stars & Trophies 10U Youth Progression Pathway, Team Northern, World Team Tennis, Net Generation, Tennis In Your Parks and a massive overhaul of our presence in the digital space with a new website (www.usta.com/northern) and a more personalized user experience through single sign-on capabilities. These new projects, in addition to continued success and growth with our core programs – USTA Leagues, Junior Tournaments and Section Infrastructure – led to USTA Northern being named the 2017 USTA Section of the Year by *Tennis Industry* magazine. We might be small in size, but we are mighty in what we can accomplish together, and I would personally like to thank our Board of

Directors, USTA Northern staff, volunteers, providers, members and others who make up our tennis "family." It is because of you, and your commitment to the game, that we received this prestigious honor.

We are also in a period of organizational change with the departure of three key staff members for new opportunities last fall. We have already promoted **Rumeal Setts** to our new Manager of Officials, and are thrilled to announce the hiring of **Becky Cantellano** as the new Executive Director/CEO. Cantellano, who was the Director of Community Tennis for the Section from 2003-12, comes back after serving as the Executive Director of Saint Paul Urban Tennis the past six years. Still on the docket is the hiring of a new Director of Community Tennis in the spring. Please take a moment to welcome and share your thoughts with Rumeal and Becky.

With change comes opportunity, and we are excited about what the future holds with these new Section leaders in making Northern even stronger on a local, Section and National level.

DID YOU KNOW...

- Over 12,480 players competed in USTA Northern Leagues, a 6.3% increase from last year's record numbers. The Twin Cities was up 4% in 2017 and Sioux Falls, Rapid City, Bismarck and Rochester all saw impressive growth in their programs. ONE Doubles continued to attract new participants as 966 players played in gender-specific leagues - a 16% increase from 2016 – and another 260 played mixed leagues, up 20% from last year. Northern also enjoyed its highest League retention rate in history at 76% and placed over 827 new players on teams in 2017 through its Matchline service.
- The Tennis In Your Parks adult beginner program expanded from two to eight communities within the Twin Cities and had 279 people find themselves in the game - up 116% from last year. Northern trained 17 instructors and developed its own curriculum for the program, while branding and marketing the program to new audiences on social media.
- Continuing to fortify its junior pathway, USTA Northern introduced Stars & Trophies events, World Team Tennis and Team Northern.
 - ◆ Specifically for kids ages 7-10, 380 unique players participated in 127 Stars and Trophies events in 2017 earning virtual stars and trophies in preparation for the junior tournament circuit.
 - ◆ Northern boasted 5,500 unique junior tournament players in 2017 and had 12 kids ranked in the Top 100 of the country.
 - ◆ Team Northern featured 21 of the best 11-14 year olds in our Section who met eight times throughout the year and embarked on a three-day training trip at the USTA National Campus in Orlando where they learned from the nation's best coaches and Team USA professionals.
 - ◆ Team Tennis was enhanced with the introduction of World Team

Tennis to complement Junior Team Tennis. Over 116 teams – 68 which played at the Section Championships - and 1,179 players took part in the inaugural season of WTT, which allowed beginning and intermediate players ages 12-18 compete in a low stress environment with their friends. Junior Team Tennis had 111 teams and over 1,200 players participate, with Life Time Fitness – Fridley's 14U Advanced team placing fifth at Nationals.

- The Section and USTA National provided over \$115,000 of support to under resourced organizations and individuals including \$16,360 in Community Tennis grants, \$2,000 for blended lines, \$6,000 in equipment grants, over \$64,000 in Facility Assistance Funding and \$30,000 in youth scholarships. USTA Northern also continued its partnership with Youthprise, raising funds for the Urban Youth Tennis and Education Fund, while the Play It Forward campaign exploded with the Section donating over 500 racquets, 100 pair of shoes, clothing, grips, balls and more to underserved high school programs. New for 2017 was Northern's partnership with Twin Cities in Motion in sponsoring a running team at the Twin Cities Marathon and raising over \$10,000 for the Serving Up Love initiative, and the creation of the Tony Stingley Diversity and Inclusion Scholarship.
- Northern solidified its infrastructure by doing 15 on-court trainings for over 220 tennis deliverers and participated in 10 different diverse festivals. The Section also ran a wheelchair tennis program, held tennis clinics at the VA Medical Center and ran the Special Olympics Area and State Games. For the second consecutive year, Northern delivered its Tenis Para Todos Hispanic/Latino program in schools and parks in Minneapolis, St. Paul and Richfield, Minn.

USTA Northern Named 2017 Section of the Year



USTA Northern was named the USTA Section of the Year for 2017 by *Tennis Industry* magazine in the publication's January 2018 issue as part of its 17th annual "Champions of Tennis" awards which honors people, businesses and organizations dedicated to improving the sport and business of tennis.

Several new programs were introduced for all ages and ability levels within USTA Northern in 2017, beginning with the Stars & Trophies 10U Youth Progression Pathway for ages 7 to 10. Team Northern was a new high performance program for ages 11 to 14, while World TeamTennis gave beginning and intermediate youth ages 12 to 18 more competitive opportunities with their friends. Tennis in Your Parks offered lessons for beginning adults or those returning to the game, while Matchline has placed 827 new players in USTA League teams over the past three years. Outreach events included Girls & Women in Tennis and Net Generation Forums.

"We are honored to be recognized as the 2017 USTA Section of the Year by *Tennis Industry* magazine," USTA Northern president **Liz Hamburg** said. "We might be small in size, but we are mighty in what we are able to do in growing and developing the game of tennis with all people in Minnesota, North and South Dakota and NW Wisconsin."

Ajay Pant Named 2017 Person of the Year

Life Time National Tennis Director **Ajay Pant** was named the 2017 "Person of the Year" by *Tennis Industry* magazine. Pant, who is based at Life Time's headquarters in Chanhassen, Minn., oversees the tennis and racquet sports business. Currently, of Life Time's 129 locations, 26 offer tennis, but that number is expected to increase in 2018. The company is the largest operator of indoor tennis facilities in the United States.

Pant's history and influence in the sport runs deep. He is one of only 10 tennis teaching professionals in the world designated as a Master Professional by the two main teaching organizations, the Professional Tennis Registry and the U.S. Professional Tennis Association. A sought-after industry presenter, he also is a longtime volunteer with the USTA and has been instrumental in key developments for bringing more youngsters into tennis.

Izabella Edin, of Staples, Minn., was named the 2017 Professional Tennis Registry (PTR) National Newcomer of the Year. The high school senior joined the organization as a PTR on Campus Member in 2016 and was certified in two PTR education pathways — a feat she accomplished in just four days.

"We see a great future ahead for Izabella," said PTR CEO **Dan Santourm**. "We are proud she chose PTR for her tennis coaching education and certification."

The PTR is the largest global organization of tennis teaching professionals with more than 15,600 members in 127 countries. It has the greatest percentage of multicultural and women members of any such organization. PTR is dedicated to educating, certifying and servicing tennis teachers and coaches around the world in order to grow the game.

Jackson Allen and Isabella Lambert Named To USTA National Leadership Team

Jackson Allen (Shakopee, Minn.) and **Isabella Lambert** (Minnetonka, Minn.), were two of 32 juniors nationwide named to the USTA National Junior Leadership Team which recognizes America's finest junior tennis players who exhibit leadership, sportsmanship and character on and off the court. Former Northern player **Paul McCallie**, now of Norcross, Ga., was also named to the team.

Allen is a multiple-time Section champion and had been ranked #1 in USTA Northern for all age groups. He was a doubles semifinalist at the Boys 16s in Kalamazoo, Mich., won the Minnesota Class AA Boys Singles Championship in 2016 and currently plays at the University of Minnesota. Allen gives back to the game on multiple levels including working as a Junior Team Tennis intern at USTA Northern, an instructor at the Shakopee Tennis Association and as a Team Northern mentor.

Lambert finished her career ranked #2 in the Section and in the top

100 nationally after winning the 2016 Minnesota Class AA Singles Championship and the Girls 18s Section title in 2017. She has been ranked in the top 10 of the Section her entire junior career and won the USTA Northern Girls 16s Section Championship in 2014. She won the Girls USTA Northern Level 4 Sportsmanship Award for Girls 18s in January. She has played Junior Team Tennis over the years and is currently playing at the University of Minnesota. Academically, Lambert has been a member of the A Honor Roll and volunteers at a local homeless shelter.

Huether Family Match Pointe Named USTA Facility of the Year

Huether Family Match Pointe in Sioux Falls, S.D., was one of 12 winners in the 36th annual USTA Facility Awards program, which recognizes excellence in the construction and/or renovation of tennis facilities throughout the country. Huether Family Match Pointe was honored at the Next Generation: A Tennis Innovation Workshop in October in Orlando, Fla.

The Huether Family Match Pointe facility boasts six indoor tennis courts in one location, something the Sioux Falls community of 175,000 has not had in more than 20 years. As the only public, non-profit facility in the area, no membership is required in order to use the courts or participate in the facility's programs. Huether Family Match Pointe attendees span a wide range of ages, offering youth lessons, adult lessons and drills, leagues and tournaments while also hosting collegiate matches, high school matches, youth play days and youth outreach programming.

"Great tennis facilities like Huether Family Match Pointe help us to grow the game at the grassroots level, and we are proud to recognize them for their ongoing impact on the sport of tennis," said **Kurt Kamperman**, USTA Chief Executive Community Tennis and the USTA National

Campus. "Huether Family Match Pointe has embraced many of our tennis initiatives and kept the sport at the forefront of its community each year."

To be considered for an award, facilities must be under the jurisdiction of a park and recreation department, an educational institution, a non-profit corporation or be a private or commercially owned and operated facility that offers both USTA and public programming designed to help grow tennis. Facilities were judged on the following criteria: overall layout and adaptation to site; excellence of court surface and lights; ease of maintenance; accommodations for players, spectators and press/officials; aesthetics; graphics (including the use of signs and landscaping); amenities such as casual seating for spectators, food services and social areas; and the facilities' participation in USTA programs.

Dan James Named USOC Paralympic Coach of the Year

Former head coach for Team USA's Paralympic tennis team and wheelchair tennis ambassador **Dan James** of St. Paul, Minn., was honored by the U.S. Olympic Committee (USOC) for his outstanding contributions made to the sport of tennis at the 2017 US Open. James had served as the head coach for the Paralympic tennis team for the last 17 years, and most recently coached professional wheelchair tennis players **David Wagner** and **Nick Taylor** to medal finishes at the 2016 Rio Olympics. Wagner earned a bronze in quad singles, and the duo took home the silver in quad doubles. A native of Northfield, Minn., who now is the Executive Director of the Positive Coaching Alliance in Seattle, became the USTA's national manager of Wheelchair Tennis in 2003, and served as tournament director for the US Open Wheelchair Competition starting in 2005. During his career, James has coached five U.S. Paralympic teams and was an integral part in exposing wheelchair tennis to a wider audience. His passion for the game brought him to more than 30 countries, coaching teams on six continents. James has also served on the International Tennis Federation's Wheelchair Tennis Advisory Panel for 11 years. He was named the Wheelchair Champion of the Year by *Tennis Industry Magazine* in 2016 and was named the ITF Coach of the Year in 2011.

"Dan James' work with wheelchair tennis players, as an administrator and a coach, has made the sport more visible in the U.S.," said **Martin Blackman**, USTA Player Development General Manager. "He has inspired hundreds of wheelchair athletes not only around the country, but the world."

Timothy Burke, Brent Frueh Selected to USTA Northern Hall of Fame

Congratulations to **Timothy Burke** (Minneapolis, Minn.) and **Brent Frueh** (Rochester, Minn.), who were inducted into the USTA Northern Hall of Fame on November 17 at Minnesota Valley Country Club in Bloomington, Minn. The duo became the 107th and 108th members of the Hall of Fame which is housed at the Fred Wells Tennis & Education Center.

Timothy Burke Minneapolis, Minn.

Originally from Rochester, Minn., Burke, who started teaching tennis at age 16, earned finalist honors in doubles at the state tournament for Mayo High School. He played two years at the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul, Minn., where he was the MIAC singles and doubles champion in 1970. Burke then transferred to the University of Minnesota and played for the Gophers in 1972.

After graduating from the U, Burke joined the Peace Corps as an English teacher in Africa. Burke was named the National Tennis Coach for Nigeria, leading them to a gold medal at the All-African Games in 1973.

He returned to the Twin Cities, serving as the Director of Adult and Junior Camps at Carleton College and the Minneapolis Tennis Club before becoming co-director at the Richfield Teaching Center with current USTA Northern Hall of Famer **Greg Lappin**. There he created a program called Adult STP, similar to today's Cardio Tennis, offering pre- and post-performance testing for its participants.

During this time, Burke started wheelchair tennis in the Section,

coaching 30 players between 1983-93. He was the head of wheelchair tennis for both the USPTA Northern Division and USTA Northern and served as Twin Cities National Wheelchair Team head coach, as well as the personal coach of nationally-ranked player **Scott McNiese**. He was the tournament director of the wheelchair division at the National Public Parks Championships and won a gold ball in the Stand-Up/Sit-Down Division. He still works today with USTA Northern's wheelchair programs at Sister Kenny in Minneapolis.

Burke has served as the head pro at Normandale Tennis Club and Minnesota Tennis Camps at Baseline Tennis Center and was an assistant coach at Bethel University from 2008-12. He also worked with former Minnesota state high school champions **Dusty** and **Toby Boyer** and has been a volunteer coach at Harding and Humboldt High Schools in St. Paul and Minneapolis Southwest High Schools. Currently, he is a teaching professional at Life Time Fitness Fridley and Assistant Girls Varsity coach at Minneapolis Southwest High School with fellow USTA Northern Hall of Famer **Susie Neet**.

A member of the USTA for over 50 years and the USPTA, Burke served as a USPTA Northern Division Board Member for 35 years, including as President, and was a member of the USPTA National Nominating Committee. He was named the USPTA Northern Division Pro of the Year in 2004 and led the USTA Northern "Tennis Across America" campaign in the 90s.

An avid USTA League and Adult Tournament player and captain, Burke has won six League section championships and was a member of the USTA Northern 50 & Over League National Championship team in 2004. He won the National Public Parks doubles title in 1984 and 1990, the USTA Northern 35s Doubles Section title (1985), as well as a gold medal in doubles and a silver medal in singles at the 2015 National Senior Games.

Burke's reach is still worldwide as he returned to Cape Town, South Africa, in both 2012 and 2015 teaching tennis to four different low-income townships in the area and donating tennis racquets to these communities. He is a published author and accomplished speaker, penning *The Strategy Circle*, and presenting at a number of conferences in the Section.

Burke and his wife, **Shelia Hickey** of South Bend, Ind., have two daughters, **Anna** and **Maggie**, and two grandsons **JJ** and **Charlie**.

Brent Frueh Rochester, Minn. (originally from Minot, N.D.)

Frueh was born and raised in Minot, N.D., where he started playing tennis as a sophomore in high school. He played collegiately at Minot State University before transferring to the University of North Dakota in 1987, where he walked on the team. He finished his collegiate career, winning conference championships in singles and doubles, as well as leading his team to the conference title in 1989.

After graduation, Frueh moved to Bismarck, N.D., where he worked as the Facility Manager at Capital Racquet and Fitness Center and also was responsible for the tennis program for Bismarck Parks and Recreation. While at Capital Racquet and Fitness, tennis participation exploded with over 400 kids playing in summer tennis programming. Frueh introduced a United States Tennis Association (USTA) pilot program called Rallyball and designed the first "mini tennis court" in the United States at Sertoma Tennis Courts in Bismarck, putting the city on the tennis map nationally and well before the 10 and Under Tennis phenomenon hit the United States. He also ran a tennis carnival with over 200 participants annually and organized the tennis community to march in the Annual Band Day Parade. For the parade, Frueh created a moving tennis court that went down the streets of Bismarck while volunteers handed out free tennis racquets with directions on where to find tennis programming to kids along the parade route.

He also coached the girls tennis team at Bismarck Century High School from 1990-2001. During that time, they became a powerhouse in the West Region of the state and were a regular fixture at the state championships. Century won state titles in 1997 and 2001 and had a 115-match western North Dakota dual match winning streak before Frueh left in 2001.

A USPTA and PTR certified coach and a USTA High Performance

Coach, Frueh moved to the Rochester Athletic Club in Rochester, Minn., in 2001, and was promoted to the facility's General Manager in 2012. In his career, he has coached over 20 junior players to state championships in both Minnesota and North Dakota.

He also has been a long-time volunteer with USTA Northern, serving on its Board of Directors from 1995-2012. In 2009-10, he was the Section's President. He has served on the USTA National level where he completed four terms on the Junior Competition Committee and has been a member of three USTA Presidential Task Forces.

For his efforts, Frueh was a four-time North Dakota High School Coach of the Year and a national finalist for High School Tennis Coach of the Year in 2001. He also earned the USTA National Eve Kraft Community Service Award and the USTA Northern Community Service Award in 1999. In 2002, Frueh and the Rochester Athletic Club staff received the USTA Northern Ward Burton Junior Development Award. He was named the PTR Newcomer of the Year Award (2000), the USPTA Northern Division Community Service Award winner (2004) and USPTA Pro of the Year (2009). He was inducted into the North Dakota Tennis Hall of Fame in 2016.

Frueh is married to **Shari** and they have two children, **Emily** and **Eric**. Eric played tennis at the University of Minnesota and was a member of the 2015 Big Ten Championship team.

ND & SD Halls of Fame Induct New Members



David Geatz, originally of Grand Forks, N.D., and **Terry Paukert**, also of Grand Forks, N.D., were inducted into the North Dakota Tennis Hall of Fame Saturday, June 24, at Choice Health & Fitness in Grand Forks as part of the China Garden Open.

Geatz, who is currently the head coach at the University of Pennsylvania, was born and raised in Grand Forks. He played tennis at Red

River High School from 1972-75, where he was a member of the state championship team in 1973. He also won the state doubles title with partner **Rich Dahlen** that year and was the North Dakota state singles champion in 1974 and 1975. He finished his high school career with a 104-3 record, with the three losses coming his freshman season. The next three years, he won 90 straight matches and was named to *Sports Illustrated's* Faces in The Crowd in 1975. He was later inducted into the Grand Forks Red River High School Athletics Hall of Fame.

He went on to play college tennis at the University of New Mexico where he earned all-conference honors in 1979, and won the conference doubles title with partner **Jess Bec-Mueller** that same year. After college, he played professionally in Europe where he won eight tournaments.

After earning his degree in University Studies from New Mexico in 1981, Geatz returned to his alma mater as the head men's tennis coach from 1983-88, leading his team to a Top 20 ranking and

earning Western Athletic Conference and NCAA Regional Coach of the Year honors.

Geatz then served as head coach of the University of Minnesota men's program from 1988-2006. During his tenure, the Gophers won five Big Ten championships and compiled a 45-match winning streak in conference play. He was a three-time Big Ten Coach of the Year and earned NCAA Regional Coach of the Year accolades once. His teams appeared in 12 straight NCAA Championships, and were

ranked as high as #10 nationally. He also coached All-American **Harsh Mankad**, who was ranked #1 in the nation in singles.

After leaving the Gophers, Geatz served as the Director of Tennis at the Hong Kong Country Club in Hong Kong, before returning to the collegiate ranks as the Associate Head Coach at Ohio State in 2007-08. He was then hired as the men's head coach at Cornell in 2008, and in 2009, coached both the men's and women's teams at Cornell until being hired as the Albert G. Molloy Head Coach of Men's Tennis at Penn in 2011.

A USTA League and tournament player throughout his career, Geatz was a member of the USTA Northern 5.5 National Championship team in 2004.

Also a native of Grand Forks, Paukert played both high school and college tennis in North Dakota - at Grand Forks Central and the University of North Dakota, respectively, where he was the doubles partner of fellow North Dakota Tennis Hall of Famer **Tim Wynne**.

After college, he began his long and storied career as a high school tennis coach which spans over 40 years including time at East Grand Forks (1978-97, 2004, 2006 and 2012-13), Grand Forks Central (1999-2008) and Grand Forks Red River (2011, 2015-current). He has been part of two North Dakota team championships, coached two doubles champions and four singles titlists, including two wins by his son, **Charlie**, at Grand Forks Central in 2003 and 2004.

Paukert has coached both boys and girls in his illustrious career. He served as a board member of the Community Tennis Association which built the Register Tennis Complex in Grand Forks. Throughout his career, he has organized free tennis programs in the city for all high school students to grow their tennis knowledge and skills, while offering free individual lessons and racquet stringing to those who would not otherwise be able to play tennis.

He was named the Minnesota State High School Coach of the Year in 1992, and was honored in 2006 with the Ward C. Burton Junior Development Award presented to an individual or organization who

has promoted the growth of tennis for juniors and served the junior tennis community in USTA Northern. In 2013, he was inducted into the Grand Forks Central High School Athletics Hall of Fame, and in 2016, received the Thomas J. Clifford Award given to an University of North Dakota alum who serve as an athletics coach at the high school or collegiate level and has been notably successful in their respective sport.

South Dakota

Two of the top tennis players ever to come out of South Dakota, **Jim Sorrell** from Sioux Falls and **Duke Paluch** of Rapid City, were inducted into the South Dakota Tennis Hall of Fame on Sunday, July 23, at McKennan Park during the Asfora/Clayton SD Adult Open.

Sorrell was one of the first players from South Dakota to play national tournaments and won three state singles titles for Sioux Falls O'Gorman from 1981-83. He also won four consecutive doubles titles and led the Knights to four straight South Dakota team championships starting in 1980. Dr. Sorrell is a gastroenterologist in Lincoln, Neb.

A high school singles finalist in 1978 for Rapid City Stevens, Paluch claimed his first state singles title the following year. He earned All-American honors, playing for legendary coach **Steve Wilkinson** at Gustavus Adolphus, where he was inducted into that school's athletic Hall of Fame in 2010. Paluch has been a teaching professional, club owner and manager in Boulder, Colo., the past 30 years.

Also honored were longtime tennis player, coach and school administrator **Tony Simons** and the **"Pioneers of SD Tennis, early 1900's to 1950's"**, who received South Dakota Tennis Achievement Awards. Simons excelled at Madison High School and led his team to conference titles while at Dakota State University, where he is part of that school's Hall of Fame. The "Pioneers of SD Tennis, early 1900's to 1950's" recognized dozens of players who made a significant mark on tennis, either as players, coaches or contributors.

Urban Youth Tennis and Education Campaign

USTA Northern is continuing to partner with Youthprise, an innovative out-of-school time intermediary, to support an Urban Youth Tennis and Education Fund. Below are 2017 initiatives that were supported by the fund.



- **Fort First Fridays** – Series of play events for tennis players from urban high schools on the first Friday of every month from October – May. Event consists of 60 minutes on-court followed by food and fellowship with an occasional speaker.
- Series of Level 8 tournaments on the third Saturday of every month to provide free match play opportunities for under-resourced youth and to introduce them to competition.
- A St. Paul Pathway Manager position to ensure youth in St. Paul are aware of and understand how to navigate programming opportunities being offered by NJTL chapters. This temporary position ended in July 2017.
- Shared bus contract to transport players on Saturdays to tennis and leadership opportunities in Minneapolis and St. Paul.
- Free clinic and match day experience for over 40 under-resourced youth as part of a Gopher Women's Division I tennis match against Wisconsin.
- Third party evaluation was completed by Sida Ly-Xiong Consulting to evaluate the collaborative and create individual organization profiles.
- A joint video from the youth perspective is being produced to highlight the impact of tennis and education programs.

Serving Up Love

- The "Play it Forward" initiative helped underserved high school tennis programs meet the equipment needs of their players by collecting gently used or new racquets, tennis shoes and over-grip from our members to distribute to disadvantaged high school tennis teams or communities. In 2017, we had requests from 41 high schools/communities and we donated over 451 racquets, 95 pairs of shoes, 292 grips and boxes of tennis clothing.
- Partnered with Twin Cities in Motion as a charity partner to raise funds for Serving Up Love through the Twin Cities Marathon. Our 26 member running team consisted of 10 marathon runners, 14 10-mile runners, and two 5K participants. The team raised a total of \$10,696.

Bill Clayton Sioux Falls, S.D.

A local attorney, Clayton was instrumental in growing tennis in Sioux Falls, S.D. After playing college tennis at UCLA and Washington and Lee for former Wimbledon champion **Fred Perry**, Clayton returned to Sioux Falls where he was instrumental in making McKennan Park the epicenter of tennis in the community where one only had to pay \$.25 for 30 minutes of lighting at night. He was the President of the Sioux Falls Tennis Club and served as Regional Vice President of what was then the Northwestern Tennis Association (now known as USTA Northern) in 1953. From 1954-62, he was Section ranked in doubles and served as an official. He and his wife, **Sally**, raised five kids – all tennis players – and they were named the NWTA Family of the Year in 1966. He and Sally were inducted into the South Dakota Tennis Hall of Fame in 1995. Clayton was 93.

Jerry Nachtigal, Sioux Falls, S.D.




