

# Let's Get You Hired!

Now that I'm a Certified Tennis Official – WHAT DO I DO NEXT?

Here are some basic ideas that work for Officials:

- Market yourself to Area Coordinators and Referees. Ask to be on their email list for events in areas that you'd like to work (we have Coordinators all over Texas). Area Coordinators' contact information can be found on our [USTA Texas Officials Page](#).
- We have "Tennis Official Associations/Organizations" in certain areas of Texas that you can be a part of if you choose. These groups can be very helpful for continued training and work opportunities.
- Your efforts in "marketing yourself" to key people will be a major factor in the amount of work you receive.
- Consistently be on the lookout for events that fit your schedule. Events can include: USTA, UTR, High School, Private School, and Adaptive events.
- Make sure that your contacts are aware of your new certification – they will work with you and put you in the right event at the right time with the right people.

Use your Officials First account to find events and Referees:

- [OfficialsFirst](#): Once on this site, go to "Events", then "Community Events", click on (advanced filters), put in the City you'd like to work in, and your Section (Texas). You can also just enter "Texas" to search all events.

## Here is an example of a simple email that you can use to send out to Tournament Referees:
