Tournament Recaps

Dream Court's 5th annual **Montgomery Open** was held on April 10th – 12th at Lagoon Park Tennis Center. Thirty-eight wheelchair tennis players from 7 different states competed in this USTA Sanctioned tournament. Because of the generosity of our Dream Court sponsors, we were able to award \$4,500 in scholarships to cover lodging and transportation, prioritizing juniors, first time participants, and special requests. They were also able to offer prize money, \$200 for each champion and \$100 for each finalist in all coed singles and doubles divisions. The most memorable aspect from the tournament was the strong support from the local community. Volunteers of all ages dedicate their time and energy to make the event run smoothly. Local businesses sponsored the event through food, refreshments, snacks, and entertainment, keeping the players and guests fueled and comfortable. Jessica Weyreuter, Executive Director of Dream Court, Inc. says, "Our tournament isn't just about tennis; it's about belonging. Our goal is to create an atmosphere where everyone involved feels welcome, needed, and irreplaceable."

Nashville All-Comers Camp

May 17th and 18th, ABLE Youth in Nashville, TN hosted a Youth Wheelchair Tennis All Comers Camp in conjunction with the USTA. All-Comers Camps are tennis camps for players who want to learn more about and grow in the sport of wheelchair tennis. Youth camps are designed to provide instruction and play opportunities for youth of any skill and experience level and is a social and semi-competitive environment for kids to have fun playing wheelchair tennis. The hope is that kids who aren't yet skilled enough to play traditional wheelchair tennis matches will get a stepping stone into playing competitively in the future as a result of the camp.



Nashville's camp featured two guest coaches from Alabama, one who has been a head coach of camps in the past and a 3-time Collegiate National Champion wheelchair tennis player for the University of Alabama. Participants spent the first day learning and practicing the four shots in wheelchair tennis, chair mobility, and tactics for playing a point, and then they got to learn how to keep score and compete in the second day. A film crew was on hand from [NECAT Network](#) to both put together footage to air at a later time and also to make history as part of the camp aired on TV live, making it the first time ever in Tennessee that adaptive sports has aired live on television. Athletes had a blast and learned a lot in the process. We can't wait to see where these athletes take their skills from here!

Collegiate

The 2025 ITA National Wheelchair Tennis Championships took place in Lake Nona, FL at the USTA National Campus in April, and it came down to all-Southern final between the University of Alabama and Auburn University. After intense competition, Alabama took home the title. This is Alabama's eighth title in the past nine tournaments. Senior Max Barbier will graduate as a three-time national champion, and it was Coach Tyler McKay's first championship in just his second year as Alabama's coach. The finals were a culmination of four days of competition between 9 teams, including Cincinnati as a brand new program, and 30 athletes. The field of teams and athletes both in their number and their talent, as well as the crowd watching the matches, displayed how far collegiate wheelchair tennis has come over the years.

Congratulations to not just Alabama but to all of the teams who competed!

Congratulations to 15-year-old Lucy Heald from Lookout Mountain, TN. She's ranked No. 8 in the world among junior wheelchair tennis players and was selected to represent Team USA as a first-team member at the 2025 BNP Paribas World Team Cup in Antalya, Turkey. In her debut at the international event, Lucy helped lead the U.S. junior team to a silver medal finish, showcasing her talent in both singles and doubles play.

Wheelchair Tennis Skill Builder

This Skill Builder comes to us from Wheel Serve Wilmington and focus on serves. As players are learning and perfecting their serve, it's helpful to start from the service line so that players can focus on finding the perfect spot for their toss and toss consistency, snapping the wrist, and following through. Players move back as the serve progresses. At Wheel Serve NC, the focus is on fun and then fundamentals. Having an enjoyable experience on court is the goal and never getting too frustrated. You can use this method to work on your own serve, too!
