## Strides In Integration

Just in the last few months, we've seen some wonderful initiatives in the integration of wheelchair tennis players with the rest of the tennis community. The Southern Tennis Foundation has a Junior Financial Assistance program for youth ages 12-18 ranked in the Southern Top 100, and for the first time, it's available to wheelchair players this year. USTA Southern recently hosted the section's first Schools/Wheelchair Tennis Workshop with over 15 state school coordinators, PE Teachers, and section TSRs participating so that wheelchair tennis can be incorporated into their schools' PE curriculum to be inclusive of students who use wheelchairs. This year, we'll also have another High-Performance Integrated Camp, begun last year, and increased integration in the NCAA Nationals. We are so excited about all of the new integration happening in wheelchair tennis!

## Coach's Corner

If you're a coach who hasn't yet coached a wheelchair tennis player, this Coach's Corner is for you! A lot of wheelchair tennis coaches don't have any experience in wheelchair tennis before they meet a wheelchair player and end up loving coaching wheelchair tennis and being really successful at it! Meet Jason Tipton, coach of junior player Lucy Heald. Tipton coached tennis in 2005 as a student at the University of Tennessee Chattanooga. After graduation, he got certified by PTR and went from working at a tennis center to Baylor School, where he coached from 2010-2022, starting as an assistant coach and progressing to head coach. During his time there, the tennis program won ten state titles and multiple singles and doubles titles. As head coach of the boys' team, they we made it to top 20 in the country. In 2022, he accepted a position as head pro at the Maclellan Tennis Center and head coach at Chattanooga Christian School.

He first met Lucy at the Maclellan Tennis Center in 2022. He was immediately impressed with her ability on the court and her passion for tennis. He said, "Lucy is the type of student every coach prays to work with. She has a strong work ethic and is working to get to the next level." Before coaching Lucy, Jason didn't have much coaching experience in wheelchair tennis. While watching a wheelchair tennis tournament, he had the opportunity to learn the nuances of wheelchair tennis.

He realized that there were many similarities between able-bodied and wheelchair tennis, and for what he didn't understand, he reached out to pros experienced in wheelchair tennis. He sought out every resource that he could find and says that one of the most important things he has done was to put himself in a wheelchair and learn as much as he could by experiencing wheelchair tennis as the athlete. It was in doing that when he really came to understand the game and the athleticism needed for wheelchair tennis. As some additional advice, Jason said that it's the job of the coach to know the heart of the player and what their goals are, and at that moment, the athlete's goals should become the coach's goals. Jason, thank you for sharing your experiences and your desire to see more coaches working with wheelchair athletes!

This tournament was also a Level 1 tournament and included 135 professional and amateur players from 22 countries and 25 states with winners and finalists from the US Open, Australian Open, French Open and Wimbledon. The tournament also had a strong group of players in the juniors division. The Cajun Classic is sanctioned by the International Tennis Federation and the USTA. It is part of ITF UNIQLO Wheelchair Tennis Tour where players compete for more than \$1 million in prize money in tournaments worldwide.
